 - 6 states, inc. California


Australian politics

- Key and Turnbull meet this Friday in Sydney
- Malcolm Turnbull has rejected a plan to raise GST in return for substantial company and personal tax cuts
 - Economic gains judged insufficient
 - Electoral risks judged too great
 - Damage with business/commentariat judged survivable
 - A "captain's call"
- Accompanied by reshuffle late last week


Turnbull's GST backdown

- Paul Kelly read it right:
 - "two iron political laws underpin Turnbull's GST retreat:
 - the economic dividends from reform are less than before
 - the political risks are greater than before.
 - "This double blow works against bold policy."
 - And robs Labor of its scare campaign
- Much other commentary much more critical

But Turnbull is dominant


